PLANS OVERHEAD LINE TO HARBOR

E. G. Lewis Would Build Fast System from City.

Eight-Minute Runs to Port, Five-Cent Fares Seen.

Palos Verdes Ranch Terminal is Part of Scheme.

An overhead monorall system that will carry passengers from downtown Los Angeles to all points in the Los Angeles Harbor district in eight minutes, is one of the posin eight ruintees, in one of the pos-sibilities of the city's near future de-velopment, according to E. G. Lewis of Atsecadero, who holds the option to buy Frank A. Vanderlip's mam-meth Pales Vordes ranch just west

The proposed monoral system patterned after the system that has been operating so successfully in Germany, is to be one of the foatures of the development of the 16.00-ner Falos Verdes ranch, it was learned yesterday through a letter from Mr. Lewis plan, his letter said, will cost \$1,000,000.

Mr. Lewis plan, his letter said, will provide for direct service from a point in the husiness section of Los Angeles to a terminal on the ranch, where provisions have been made to ofter a site for the establishment of a branch of the university of California, a \$1,000.009 hotel and other wast projects. A branch of the monorali line will run from the Palos Verdes terminal to the heart of the harbor section, his letter sates.

"We are contemplating the construction of an overhead monorali fast line direct from dewntowa Los Angeles to the Palos Verdes estate, with a branch to Los Angeles Harbor," the letter says.
